



Park at the Childe Rd car park. TL here over mini island on Childe Rd. Follow for short period until TR down into Car Park/alley to Church St, A4117.

Go over Church St crossing, TR, and TL on Eagle Ln. to comer kissing gate.

Go through kissing gate, TR up to another kissing gate, TL and continue uphill to stile, TR to another stile, TL after and keep bam remains on left. Continue downhill to stile/Rowley Brook. Keep R at brook and follow path diagonally up left of pylons to stile. Follow fence uphill to stile and then down to track/cattle grid at field base.

TL here on track to Old Reaside
Manor Farm. Walk through to track end
TL at stile (do not TR here) on path
down to R. Rea footbridge. TR and
continue diagonally up over field,
through fenceline, then TL down sunken
track to a minor road.

TL at junction (Please take care on minor road) down and over the River

Rea. Continue uphill on road for 0.5km to track/bridleway on right. TR down through farmyard and then to River Rea. Continue (Please use footbridge) over the river/weir(s). Continue on main track as it curves to the right & then left uphill.

Follow track uphill left keeping
Manor and grounds on left. Follow main
track around to left/small 'T' junction.

TR along driveway briefly to bridleway on left (see footpath sign). TL down by walled gardens and follow track down to River Rea footbridge. Continue straight up field, follow fenceline to stile. Continue straight on, with fence on left.

Look for stile on left, path splits here, T (half) R and follow down to stile and mill. Continue up on to Pinkham Lane. Follow up to 'T' junction/comer. TL, on Pinkham Ln until road splits. TR down to Barkers Ln/brook. TL here, follow brook path to spring/ 'The Wells' & A4117. Cross road (please take care here) to church path uphill. TL at Childe Rd to mini island and car park.

Route Facts Cleobury is classed as the smallest town in Shropshire with a population of just over 3,000. Once the domain of the Mortimer Lords Cleobury played an important role as a border town.
